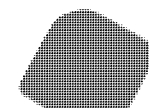

Legislation: Before Entering - R9

Study permit

R9 (1) A foreign national may not enter Canada to study without first obtaining a study permit.

Interpretation

R2 The definitions in this section apply in these Regulations.

study permit means a written authorization to engage in academic, professional, vocational or other education or training in Canada that is issued by an officer to a foreign national. (*permis d'études*)

Definition

ACADEMIC: Post-secondary program that awards academic credentials to persons for whom the normal entrance requirement is high school completion or higher. Often delivered at institutions that award an academic degree, diploma or certificate, such as:

- College and university
- CEGEP
- Seminary
- Institute of technology

PROFESSIONAL: Usually offered to a person who is already a professional in a given field. Generally “accredited” (i.e. recognized by an industry, association or profession) and can be offered by learning institutions or professional associations, regulatory bodies or unions (e.g. real estate appraisal, food services management or specialty courses for lawyers, doctors, accountants, business administrators, engineers, dentists, teachers).

VOCATIONAL: Preparation for a specific occupation in an industry or a trade that is generally “accredited.” May be offered through on-the-job programs, by unions in conjunction with businesses/employers, or by learning institutions in conjunction with specific industry/employer. This may include technical, organizational or basic skills training.

OTHER: Courses that don't belong to one of the other categories e.g. French second language (FSL) or English second language (ESL).

Not Considered Studies

The following **are not considered** studies for the purposes of IRPA:

- ❖ pre-kindergarten
- ❖ courses of general interest/hobby or self-improvement
- ❖ distance learning
- ❖ audited courses

- ❖ Settlement and integration courses offered by a provincial or territorial government through settlement and integration providers (including francization courses offered by the Government of Quebec, as they are considered settlement and integration courses and not language courses by IRCC)

Study Permit Exemptions – R188(1)

No permit required

R188 (1) A foreign national may study in Canada without a study permit

(a) if they are a **family member** or a **member of the private staff of a foreign representative** who is **properly accredited** by the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade and who is in Canada **to carry out official duties** as a diplomatic agent, consular officer, representative or official of a country other than Canada, of the United Nations or any of its agencies or of any international organization of which Canada is a member;

(b) as a member of the **armed forces** of a country that is a designated state for the purposes of the *Visiting Forces Act*, including a person who has been designated as a civilian component of those armed forces;

(c) if the duration of their course or program of **studies is six months or less** and will be completed within the period for their stay authorized upon entry into Canada; or

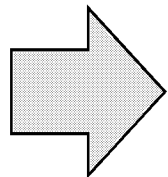
(d) if they are an **Indian** (under the Indian Act).

Study Permit Exemptions – R188(1)(c)

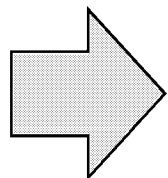
No permit required

R188 (1) A foreign national may study in Canada without a study permit

(c) if the duration of their course or program of studies is **six months or less** **and** will be completed within the period for their stay authorized upon entry into Canada



The duration of the course or program of study is often a more important consideration than the number of months the foreign national intends to study.



With the exception of exchange programs, even if foreign nationals plan to study for 6 months or less, **if the course or program is longer than 6 months, they need a study permit.**

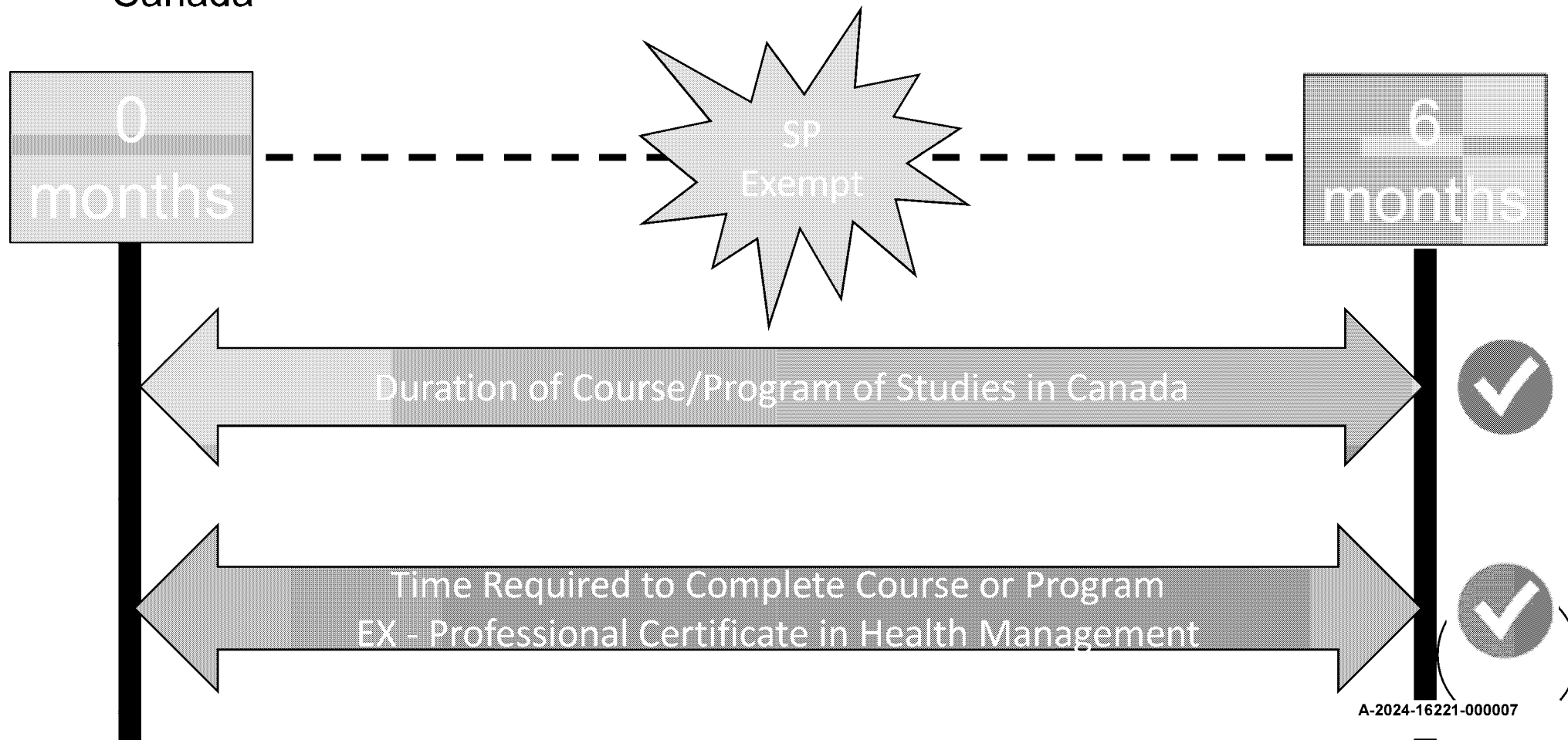
R188(2) Despite paragraph (1)(c), a foreign national may apply for a study permit before entering Canada for a course or program of studies of a duration of six months or less.

Study Permit Exemptions

Expired study permits

R189 A foreign national who has made an application under subsection 217(1) is authorized to study without a study permit until a decision is made on the application if they have remained **in Canada** since the expiry of their study permit and continue to comply with the conditions, other than the expiry date, set out on the expired study permit.

Minor children

A30(2) Every minor child **in Canada**, other than a child of a temporary resident not authorized to work or study, is authorized to study at the pre-school, primary or secondary level.

Provincial/Territorial Attestation Letter (PAL/TAL)

Ministerial Instructions 75 (MI75): Amendments to Ministerial Instructions with respect to the processing of certain applications for a study permit

“provincial attestation letter”

means a letter written and signed by a provincial or territorial government confirming that an applicant has a space within the provincial or territorial allocation for study permit applications, and must include the following information of the foreign national:

1. full name,
2. date of birth, and
3. address. (*lettre d'attestation provinciale*)

Conditions

In order to be accepted for processing, any study permit application subject to these Instructions that was received at or after January 22, 2024, 8:30 EST must include a provincial or territorial attestation letter.

Study permit applications received by the Department at or after January 22, 2024, 8:30 EST that do not include a provincial or territorial attestation letter will not be accepted for processing, and processing fees will be returned.

Provincial/Territorial Attestation Letter (PAL/TAL)

Scope

These Instructions apply to applications for a study permit made under the student class, referred to in Part 12 of the Regulations, **except** for:

- a.
 - b.
 - c.
 - d.
 - e.
- In-Canada
- f. received from foreign nationals planning to study at the primary school or secondary school level;
 - g. received from foreign nationals planning to study in a graduate degree program at the master's or doctoral level;
 - h. received from foreign nationals planning to study at a designated learning institution referred to in subparagraph 211.1(a)(i) of the Regulations [administered by a federal department or agency – federally designated military college];
 - i. received from foreign nationals who are recipients of a scholarship for non-Canadians administered and funded by Global Affairs Canada; and
 - j. received from foreign nationals who are eligible to apply for an exemption from study permit requirements based on the provisions of a public policy issued by the Minister of Citizenship and Immigration under section 25.2 of the Act as part of a migration response to a crisis or other pressure.

Definition of *designated learning institution*

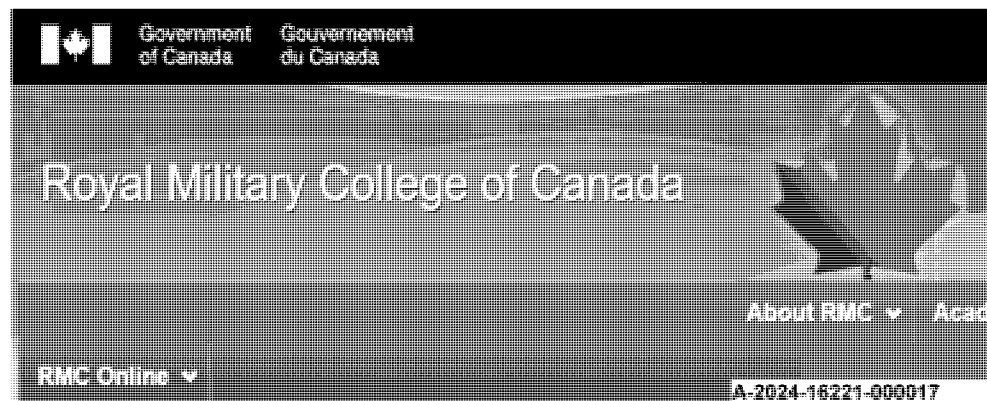
R211.1 In this Part, *designated learning institution* means ...

- **all primary and secondary institutions in Canada, which are automatically designated, unless the province or territory in which they are located has entered into an agreement or arrangement with the Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) in order to designate specific educational institutions**
- **at the post-secondary level, educational institutions designated by provinces and territories for the purpose of hosting international students**
- an evergreen list of DLIs at the post-secondary level is available on the [IRCC website](#))
- learning institutions that are administered by a federal department or agency

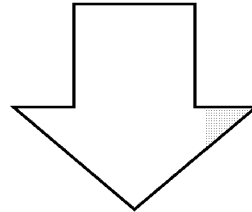

(A) Requirements of this Part – R219

Acceptance letter

R219 (1) A study permit shall not be issued to a foreign national unless they have written documentation from the designated learning institution where they intend to study that states that they have been accepted to study there.

All post-secondary DLIs must verify the LOA included in post-secondary study permit applications submitted outside Canada

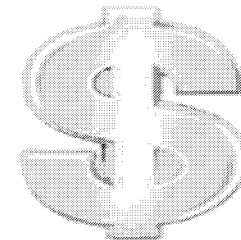

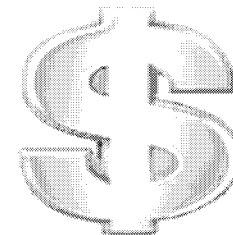
R220 An officer shall not issue a study permit to a foreign national, other than one described in paragraph 215(1)(d) or (e), unless they have sufficient and available financial resources, without working in Canada, to

(a) pay the tuition fees for the course or program of studies that they intend to pursue;

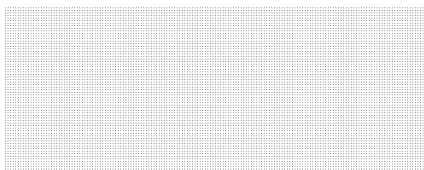
(b) maintain themselves and any family members who are accompanying them during their proposed period of study; and

(c) pay the costs of transporting themselves and the family members referred to in paragraph (b) to and from Canada.

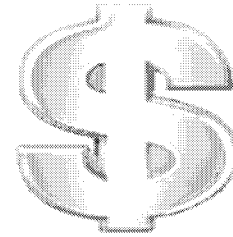
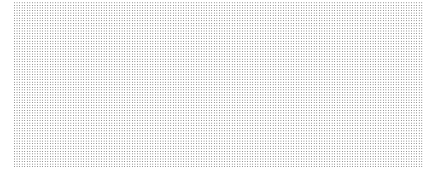


For 2024, a single applicant will need to show they have **CAN\$20,635**, in addition to their first year of tuition and travel costs. This change applies to new study permit applications received, **on or after January 1, 2024**.

This amount reflects updated cost-of-living requirements. Going forward, these amounts will be adjusted each year, as Statistics Canada updates the LICO.

Living expenses

Living expenses cover the expenses of daily life in Québec.

The following are the amounts, in Canadian dollars, that you must have between January 1 and December 31, 2024. They may vary depending on the age and number of people included in your application:

- One person under the age of 18: \$7,541
- One person aged 18 and over: \$15,078
- Two people aged 18 and over: \$22,115
- Two people aged 18 and over and one person under the age of 18: \$24,773
- Two people aged 18 and over and two people under the age of 18: \$26,737

(C) Requirements of this Part – R221

Failure to comply with conditions

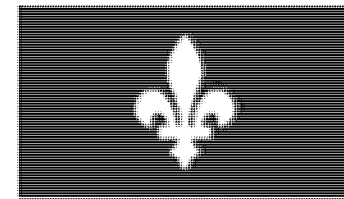
R221 Despite Division 2, a study permit **shall not** be issued to a foreign national who has engaged in unauthorized work or study in Canada or who has failed to comply with a condition of a permit unless

(a) a period of six months has elapsed since the cessation of the unauthorized work or study or failure to comply with a condition;

(b) **the work or study was unauthorized by reason only** that the foreign national did not comply with conditions imposed under paragraph 185(a), any of subparagraphs 185(b)(i) to (iii) or paragraph 185(c) [period authorized for their stay, type of work/studies, employer/educational institution, location, times/periods, etc.]; or

(c) the foreign national was subsequently issued a temporary resident permit under subsection 24(1) of the Act.

(D) Study in Quebec – R216(3)



R216 (3) An officer shall not issue a study permit to a foreign national who intends to study in the Province of Quebec — other than under a federal assistance program for developing countries — and does not hold a ***Certificat d'acceptation du Québec (CAQ)***.

A foreign national destined to Quebec is exempt from the CAQ requirement in the following situations:

- students who wish to enroll in a program or course lasting six months or less
- recipients of Commonwealth scholarship or a full bursary (covering all expenses) from Global Affairs Canada (formerly the Canadian International Development Agency), including Francophonie scholarships
- participants in a Canadian aid program for developing countries
- the spouse and dependent children of diplomats, consular officers or international representatives or officials staying in Quebec
- **minor children (under 18 years of age)**
 - of preschool age (age 4 to 5)
 - at the primary or secondary level, **already located in Quebec accompanied by** either parent who holds a work or study permit
 - This also applies to the renewal of their study permits.
 - at the primary or secondary level, **already located in Quebec** and are **unaccompanied**
 - This also applies to the renewal of their study permits.
- a minor child seeking asylum or recognized as a refugee or a person in need of protection in Canada, or the child of an asylum seeker or recognized refugee or person needing protection in Canada
- holders of a valid Certificat de sélection du Québec (Quebec Selection Certificate) and whose permanent residence application is processed in Canada, in particular persons who are recognized refugees, persons who belong to the class of spouse in Canada and persons authorized by IRCC to have their application processed in Canada for humanitarian considerations

Study Permit Issuance – R216(1)

- (d) meets the requirements of subsections 30(2) and (3), if they must submit to a medical examination under paragraph 16(2)(b) of the Act; and
- (e) has been accepted to undertake a program of study at a designated learning institution.

Conditions – Study Permit Holder

R220.1 (1) The holder of a study permit in Canada is subject to the following conditions:

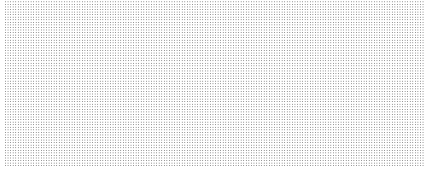
- (a)** they shall enroll at a designated learning institution and remain enrolled at a designated learning institution until they complete their studies; and
- (b)** they shall actively pursue their course or program of study.

Full-time vs. Part-time Studies

****The definition of full-time or part-time depends on the DLI.**

However, the student must have full-time status in order to work on/off campus.**

Work Permit Exemption - R186(f)

ON CAMPUS

No Work Permit required

R186 A foreign national may work in Canada without a work permit

(f) if they are a full-time student, on the campus of the university or college at which they are a full-time student, for the period for which they hold a study permit to study at that university or college;

An “on-campus” employer can be:

- the school
- faculty member
- student organization
- yourself, if:
 - you run a business that is physically located on-campus (for example: you own a coffee shop that is located on campus)
- private business
- private contractor that provides on-campus services to the school

OFF CAMPUS

Work Permit Exempt - R186(v)

No Work Permit required

R186 A foreign national may work in Canada without a work permit

(v) if they are the holder of a study permit and

(i) they are a full-time student enrolled at a designated learning institution as defined in section 211.1,

(ii) the program in which they are enrolled is a post-secondary academic, vocational or professional training program, or a vocational training program at the secondary level offered in Quebec, in each case, of a duration of six months or more that leads to a degree, diploma or certificate, and

(iii) although they are permitted to engage in full-time work during a regularly scheduled break between academic sessions, they work no more than 20 hours per week during a regular academic session;

R205 A work permit may be issued under section 200 to a foreign national who intends to perform work that

(c) is designated by the Minister as being work that can be performed by a foreign national on the basis of the following criteria, namely,

(i) the work is related to a research program **,

** Research – eligibility

- coming to Canada to work temporarily for the International Development Research Centre of Canada;
- sponsored by Atomic Energy of Canada Ltd. as distinguished scientists or post-doctoral fellows;
- sponsored by the National Research Council of Canada (NRC), the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC), Natural Resources Canada (NRCan), or a department or agency that is associated with NRCan and participating in the Postdoctoral Research Program for distinguished scientists and scholars coming to participate in research for these departments and agencies as part of the Postdoctoral Research Program (departments and agencies that have joined NRCan's Postdoctoral Research Program are responsible for issuing their own letters of offer to candidates); or
- holders of research chair positions at a Canadian university, nominated for their research excellence and partially or wholly funded by federal or provincial governments.

Work Permit Required - LMIA Exemption (Essential Co-Op / Work Component)

Canadian interests

R205 A work permit may be issued under section 200 to a foreign national who intends to perform work that

(c) is designated by the Minister as being work that can be performed by a foreign national on the basis of the following criteria, namely,

(i.1) the work is an essential part of a post-secondary academic, vocational or professional training program offered by a designated learning institution as defined in section 211.1,

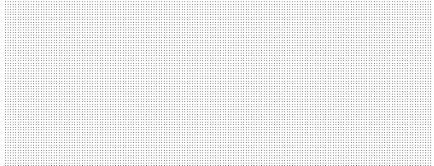

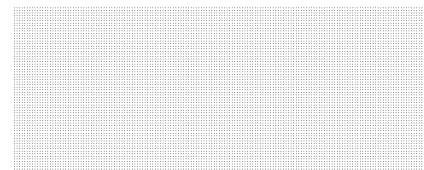

Minor Students: Custodianship Declaration
